EDITORIAL

MRA SA began life in June 1979. By December that year we had organised our first Toy Run. With a few hundred bikes, a spacious oval at Woodside, live music, the support of a few local traders like Melba's Chocolates, foodies and the pub, an impromptu bike show, a few thousand dollars-worth of toys and a lot of curious members of the public, including locals and tourists, it was reckoned a great success.

Fast-forward seventeen years and the Toy Run has grown immensely, bikes number in their thousands, the value of donated toys is well into seven figures, the town is having trouble catering for everybody, the Onkaparinga Valley Road Verdun to Woodside) is not getting any wider or smoother and we've had a couple of errant-vehicle experiences with goggle-eyed drivers who forgot to pay attention to what they were doing.

We move to Hahndorf Oval, seduced by the enthusiastic support and welcome proffered by Mount Barker Council and the local traders.

We still start the Toy Run at Glenelg, but where once we filled up the end of Anzac Highway and could notify the bikers of pertinent matters via loud hailer or police squad car speakers, the milling throng now extends well beyond Adelphi Terrace (about 200 metres) and we've given up trying to make announcements. 9 a.m. still seems like a reasonable time to start gathering, though.

fourteen years and Fast-forward another the exponential growth of the Toy Run is evident. The head of the run is at Old Tapley's Hill Road, 500 metres from the end of the highway. Bikers amass all the way up Colley Terrace and in every adjacent side street. They come at 7.30 or 8 o'clock to get near the front, catering has been provided by community groups for many years, and the Stamford Grand Hotel is now offering us discounted breakfast of good quality. Riders no longer stay at home on the offchance of rain lest their pride and joy gets dirty.

The Toy Run now takes over an hour to pass any given point. Hahndorf Oval is at capacity with motorcycle trade and club displays, the Xtreme Trials Show of Adrian and Tanya Harry's, stalls ranging from tools to knick-knacks, clothing and jewellery, and smorgasbord of catering choices. Motorcyclists' generosity has provided toys and goods worth over four million dollars to St Vincent de Paul for distribution to families (Vinnies actively assists the Toy Run Committee throughout the year), and the sun shines as ordered.

The MRA Toy Run has certainly come of age.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Toy Run Changes

As you will have heard the route of the Toy Run has changed for this year. Instead of coming off the Freeway at the Mount Barker exit we will be using the Hahndorf exit. An incident on the one way section from Mt. Barker to Hahndorf last year with a local going the wrong way, heading for the bikes has made SAPOL rethink their attitude to our one way route. To get riders used to a change the route from the Hahndorf exit to Hahndorf will be two way traffic but the route will be controlled by SAPOL, especially the roundabout just off the exit. From Pine Avenue to the Oval will be one way. Next year we will work with SAPOL to get the former route restored albeit as two way traffic.

Last year we had to park bikes in the adjacent paddock due to an overflow from the Oval. Parking on the top oval will be better organised and there is not expected to be any overflow this year. Consequently, and according to the wishes of the landowner there will be no bike parking in the paddock.

Toy Run Sponsors

The Toy Run could not be put on without the many volunteers and sponsors that contribute time, services and funds to the event. The volunteers (probably about 35 people) will be thanked personally and it is proper that we acknowledge our sponsors here.

The Motor Accident Commission is our major sponsor and has also contributed time and ideas to make the run more interesting this year. The Councils of Holdfast Bay and Mount Barker provide advice and traffic management services to keep the riders safe. Mount Barker Council also generously provides a grant of \$3,500 towards the running of the event. The Pancake Kitchen has once again provided the shade tents for the Oval. First Care Medical provides the ambulances and medical staff for the run and at the Oval at no cost. SAPOL manages the Run from Glenelg to Hahndorf in a safe and orderly fashion.

TOLL SPD provides the pantecs from which the band plays at no charge and the band performs for a minimal fee. B&C Security provides security for the weekend at a reduced cost to the MRA. Side Access provides the scaffolding for the speakers at no charge and the Mixer works for a reduced fee. Cambridge Hire of Mt. Barker provide the BBQs for the Vinnies BBQ tent at no charge. Adrian Harry Xtreme Trials performs at a reduced rate. Startrack, which takes care of our container, carts our equipment and stock around in one of their trucks on the weekend. Couriers Please distributes our posters around town at no charge. Signarama has provided signs at no charge. The SES helps out with traffic management at the Oval on the day. Glen Dix comes down to Glenelg to wave us off every year. Atlas Hire sets up our marquee at no charge and Trevor Denton provides the golf cart for the weekend at a reduced rate. John Farrington lets us use his paddock for car parking. If I've missed anyone out, please forgive me.

As you can see, the community pitches in to make this event a success every year and for that we thank you all, the Vinnies thank you and the children whom we help will thank you on Christmas Day when they open their presents.

Cynthia Dorwood Rides On

A long term MRA member and motorcycle activist Cynthia Dorwood, has died after a long illness. Cynthia rode with many of us in the early days of the MRA, when she was known as Sammi Ross, and her determination to have a good life at the end of was as strong as her determination in the past.

The DVD's have formed a library used by long stay patients; unfortunately there are motorcyclists among them. A broken pelvis will see a rider flat on his back for 6 to 10 weeks

Unlike the original 4 personal DVD players, the 6 DVD players in this donation will plug directly into the television installed beside every bed and play on AV. The patient does not have to pay to watch the DVD's. This will bring the number of DVD's donated to the library to over 120.

Greg Janzow, Joanne and Andrew King and I represented the 4Bs and Dave Russell, the Relief Clinical Nurse Consultant for Ward R3 of the Royal Adelaide Hospital, laid on a fabulous reception. There were lots of the medical staff present, along with the Director of Nursing and the Volunteer Coordinator. The RAH media unit sent a journalist and photographer who will write an article for inclusion in the RAH quarterly magazine, Vital Signs.

Something I would like you think about. If you know someone who has spent some time in a hospital and can relate to the need for something to help the time to pass, let them know they can help someone in there now by donating a couple of DVD's for the 4Bs to pass on. The second idea is to follow Meradene's lead and have your work or social group donate something you would like to watch. Why not set a goal of 6 DVD's in 2011.

The 4Bs monthly dinner meetings are now held at the Prince Albert Hotel, 254 Wright Street, Adelaide. 7.00pm on the first Wednesday of the month, excluding January.

A special guest attended the 4Bs November meeting. Adrian Weissenfeld is researching motorcycle accidents for his PhD with the Centre for Automotive Safety Research at Adelaide University. This position has been funded by Motorcycling Australia. I am sure we will hear a lot more as his study develops.

DOOHAN BACKS TAC CALL TO END MOTORBIKE CARNAGE

On the eve of the Australian Motorcycle Grand Prix World Champion Mick Doohan joined the Transport Accident Commission (TAC) and Victoria Police in their bid to increase rider safety and stop this year's motorcycle death rate soaring even higher.

Mick Doohan supported the TAC as it launched its 12th MotoGP campaign focussing on educating riders about the importance of wearing protective clothing and riding within their limits.

The timing couldn't be better as already this year 41 motorcyclists have been killed on Victorian roads, 71 per cent higher than this time last year.

Victoria Police ran one of their biggest ever MotoGP operations in a bid to reduce motorcycle fatalities and ensure the safety for all road users.

The MidNorth MRA has done a great job over 20 years setting things up and are very welcoming. It's a rally where you can bring the family for a good time. The clubroom is the centre of activity and the rally is fully catered for, with barbeque and other food and drinks at very reasonable prices. Here is a spacious green area where rallygoers can relax and socialise with facilities close at hand. There are novel trophies awarded for long distance riders, etc., a raffle and a special commemorative port is on sale. There is also a gymkhana with prizes held on the Saturday afternoon and that's always good for a laugh.

This year I arrived on Friday afternoon and by the evening there were almost 100 happy campers. I was amazed at how sophisticated the camping has become, what with huge bikes and trikes and camper trailers with all the mod cons. It's a far cry from the basic facilities of 1989. This year the weather was perfect for camping out and apart from the "human buzzsaws" in neighbouring camp sites the night was quiet. Unfortunately I couldn't stay beyond Saturday morning but I hear that the rally was a great success for which we can thank the Mid-North boys, Greg, Toot and Lauren. Terrific job fellas!

PINK RIBBON RIDE 2010

The day of the ride turned out to be perfect weather. About 300 riders left the Arkaba Hotel car park and headed up the Freeway to Hahndorf, Nairne down the old Princes Highway to Minarto and then across to Mannum. CAR SAFE BROCHURE

ROAD SAFETY OFFICER REPORT Neville Gray

USA STATS

Data released by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration shows a decrease in motorcycle fatalities for 2009. There was a 16% drop in motorcycle fatalities, breaking an 11-year trend of annual increases. Overall there was a 6.3% drop in motorcycle injuries for 2009 compared to the previous year.

Government data showing reduced injury and fatality rates for motorcyclists in 2009 comes with the MIC reporting a 5% increase in miles ridden in the same year.

The 4462 reported motorcycle fatalities in 2009 mark an 850 decrease from the previous year. Of those fatalities, 1314 were classified as alcohol-impaired (meaning they involved either an alcohol-impaired driver or rider), down from 1561 the year prior, also a 16% drop. Injuries saw 90,000 reported last year, down from the 96,000 reported in 2008. The full NHSTA report can be read at <u>http://wwwnrd.nhtsa.dot.gov/Pubs/811363.pdf</u>.

While sobering, the reduction of injuries and deaths is made the more impressive by an increase in miles ridden. In its own press release commenting on the government figures, the Motorcycle Industry Council (MIC) reckons motorcycle miles travelled increased by "approximately 5% last year, some 1.3 billion more miles than in 2008, according to the Motorcycle Industry Council's 2009 Motorcycle Owner Survey."

"There's always more work to promote and improve safety, but everyone at the Motorcycle Industry Council is heartened by this news," said MIC Chairman Larry Little in the MIC press announcement. "It shows that we can lower our level of risk out on the road, while we're putting more miles on more bikes for both transportation and pure fun. The MIC conducts research that's absolutely relevant to this story. Our Motorcycle Owner Survey provides the best information available on American motorcyclists. It's the only accurate source for motorcycle miles traveled and it's one of the MIC's more important efforts to assist riders everywhere. We thank all our members for funding this vital study."

The American Motorcyclist Association has taken a more cautious tone responding to the news.

"The death of any motorcyclist is one too many, so this news that fatalities are down is encouraging," said AMA senior vice president for government relations, Ed Moreland, in the AMA's own press announcement. "While we are pleased that the number of motorcycling fatalities dropped dramatically in 2009, a one-year drop isn't a trend. We need to determine why, and ensure that the decline continues."

Moreland goes on to note that motorcycle deaths followed a similar downward trend in the '80s and '90s before climbing on the aforementioned 11-year annual increase. Moreland stresses that more definitive data needs to analyzed citing the forthcoming crash study at the Oklahoma State University

"The motorcycling community looks forward to receiving some real answers about motorcycle crashes and what causes them from the new federal crash causation study that is under way at Oklahoma State University (OSU) through the Oklahoma Transportation Center in Stillwater," said Moreland. "Then we can put our heads together to find solutions, reduce crashes and save more lives."

The AMA and Secretary LaHood are notably at odds over possible solutions to further reduce motorcycle injury and fatality rates. This is due to the AMA's rigid stance against mandatory helmet laws, stressing instead that government solutions should focus on accident prevention.

The trend of lower motorcycles accidents reflects the overall trend of motor vehicles United States, with 2009 registering the lowest fatality and injury rates on record (1.26 deaths per million miles in 2008 compared to 1.13 deaths per million in 2009). The 2009 highway death total of 33,808 is the lowest since 1950, and the grim statistic is made the more impressive considering the slight 0.2% increase in miles traveled when compared to 2008.

"At the Department of Transportation, we are laserfocused on our top priority: safety," said U.S. Transportation Secretary Ray LaHood in a press release announcing the statistics. "Today's announcement shows that America's roads are the safest they've ever been. But they must be safer. And we will not rest until they are."

One of the planned initiatives to further drive down the fatality and accident rates is an initiative against distracted driving. LaHood will chair a National Distracted Driving Summit on Sept 21 in Washington D.C., the summit focusing on the problem of texting and cell phone.

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
